2025 SC READY Test Results

Annually, students in grades 3-8 participate in the SC READY state assessment program. These tests are aligned to the South Carolina College-and Career-Ready Standards for English Language Arts (ELA) and math. Students in grades 4 and 6 also participate in the SC READY science testing program. These tests are aligned to the South Carolina College-and Career-Ready Science Standards. During the 2024-2025 school year, all students took state assessments online, unless paper administration was required based on individual educational plans.

2025 SAT Test Results (Grade 12)

The Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) is a standardized test often used in the college admissions process. SAT results are based on graduating seniors in 2025. Students are counted only once, no matter how often they test and only their latest score is used in these calculations.

Total scores are calculated using the actual (before rounding) score for each test. Twelfth graders actively enrolled in SC Public Schools as of the 135th day of the 2024-2025 school year are included in the calculations. Note: Data is from August 2025.

Noted below are the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) mean scores for seniors in Dillon School District Four compared to graduating seniors that took the test in the state and nation.

2025 EOCEP Test Results

The End-of-Course Examination Program (EOCEP) provides tests in high school core courses and for courses taken in middle school for high school credit. EOCEP results are used in the calculation of middle school and high school Absolute Ratings and Growth Ratings.

Prior to graduation, students must enroll in four required EOC courses and participate in the mandated examination program for: Algebra, Biology I, English 2, and U.S. History and the Constitution.

The chart below shows the percentage of students that scored a C or better on their EOCEP coursework during the 2024-2025 school year.

2025 ACT Test Results (Grade 12)

The American College Test (ACT) is a national college admissions examination that consists of subject area tests in English, mathematics, reading, and science. The test includes multiple-choice questions, with a 36 being the highest possible score. The test is offered six times per year in the U.S. and is usually taken during a student's junior or senior year of high school. In Dillon School District Four, all students enrolled in the 11th grade, have the option to take the ACT test, during the school day. Noted below are mean ACT scores for 2025 graduating seniors.

- Dillon Elementary School celebrated the opening of the new 4K-3rd grade facility with staff, students, parents, and the community, during Open House and a Ribbon Cutting Ceremony.
- Dillon Elementary School students had the opportunity to participate in monthly huddles with Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA) to promote social and emotional growth.
- Dillon Elementary School hosted various family events and learning workshops to enhance home-school relationships, including parent conferences, literacy nights, and STEM activities.
- During the 2024-2025 school year, Dillon Elementary School and Lake View Elementary School received grant funding from Save the Children. Students in 5K-3rd grade received tutoring in-school, after-school, and during summer school. Families with young children, birth to four years old, had the opportunity to participate in the *Early Steps to School Success* home visiting program and families with students enrolled in 4K had the opportunity to participate in the "Raising a Reader" book exchange program. Both schools also qualified to receive Gifts-in-Kind to share with students and families.
- Lake View Elementary School was proud to partner with the *Reading for Education* organization. The school received funds to be used for academic improvement and books for students.
- Lake View Elementary School had a nine-point gain on the *School Report Card* issued by the SC Department of Education (SCDE). The "Average" overall rating signifies that "School performance meets the criteria to ensure all students meet the Profile of the SC Graduate."
- Gordon Elementary School initiated *Celebration Walks* to recognize students for academic achievement.
- Local barbers visited Gordon Elementary School to give haircuts to students that made the Honor Roll.
- Students enrolled in the Nail Technician Program at the Dillon County Technology Center, visited Gordon Elementary to paint the nails of students who were on Honor Roll.
- Dillon Middle School had a three-point gain on the School Report Card issued by the SC Department of Education (SCDE). The "Average" overall rating signifies that "School performance meets the criteria to ensure all students meet the Profile of the SC Graduate."
- Dillon Middle School students enjoyed various field trips to broaden their knowledge and experiences. Students who showed all-around effort, maintained good grades, and followed school rules, had the opportunity to go bowling and skating.
- The Dillon Middle School band performed at the Carowinds Festival of Music. Their outstanding performance earned them a "Superior" rating. This marked the 5th consecutive year that the band earned the highest honor given at the festival.
- Lake View High School had 250 students to qualify for *Maniac Incentive*, which ties discipline and academics to attendance.
- Based on academic achievement, test results, school climate, parent involvement, and more, Lake View High School received "Good" *School Report Card* ratings for both their middle school program and their high school program. An overall rating of "Good" signifies that "School performance exceeds the criteria to ensure all students meet the Profile of the SC Graduate."
- During the 2024-2025 school year, the Adult and Continuing Education Consortium offered diploma, GED, basic classes, and Workforce preparation coursework. Eleven graduates received secondary credentials and thirty-six students earned Work Ready career readiness credentials.
- Dillon High School reported an increase in the graduation rate and an increase in the number of students earning career-ready status and OSHA certifications.
- The Dillon County Technology Center reported an increase in the number of students earning industry certifications: YouScience, CompTIA (Cyber Security), and OSHA 10.

2025 Career Readiness Assessment (Grade 11)

The WIN Learning Corporation provides a credentialing approach to ensure learners and job seekers have mastered the employability skills and foundational academic knowledge that employers seek and jobs demand. The career assessment measures mastery of academic "hard" skills and essential "soft" skills needed for job success. The WIN Learning *Work Ready* Assessment is a workforce education and development tool, comprised of three parts: Math Assessment, Reading Assessment, and Data Assessment. Except for students eligible for alternate assessments, all students in their third year of high school, after their initial enrollment in the ninth grade are required to take the WIN Learning *Work Ready* Assessment.

Students that complete all three academic sections earn a credential in one of the predetermined skill levels: Level 2, Level 3, Level 4, Level 5.

- The math assessment** measures foundational workplace mathematical reasoning and problem-solving skills from basic addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division to multiple math functions like calculating percentage discounts and markups.
- The reading assessment** measures reading comprehension and critical thinking skills using written text, including emails, websites, letters, signs, notices, bulletins, policies, and regulations.
- The data assessment** measures comprehension and application of workplace graphics, such as, charts, graphs, tables, forms, flowcharts, diagrams, floor plans, maps, and instrument gauges.

The WIN Learning essential "soft" skills assessment measures skills needed for success in the workplace via a pass/fail system.

- Essential Soft Skills** measure foundational work habits and employability skills that employers nationwide commonly define as essential to gain and maintain employment, such as, cooperating with others, resolving conflicts, negotiating, solving problems, observing critically, and taking responsibility for learning. If students pass this section of the career assessment test, they receive a separate "soft" skills credential.

Northeastern Technical College (NETC)

Dillon School District Four has a written agreement with Northeastern Technical College (NETC). High school students can participate in NETC classes, which will help them become college-and career-ready. Dual Credit and Dual Enrollment courses are available to students. If students are interested in enrolling in NETC courses, they must complete the registration process and receive permission from their high school principal and/or assigned school counselor.
